

WHAT IS STEP?

Support and Training for Exceptional Parents, Inc. (STEP) is a statewide program in Tennessee, established in 1989 by a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The purpose of STEP is to support families by providing free information, training, and support services to parents of children eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). STEP houses the Parent Training Information Center (PTI) and operates a number of grants and initiatives to meet our mission.

WHOM DOES STEP SERVE?

STEP services are available FREE to any parent or family member of a child or youth, birth through age 26, with a disability that has or may need special education services under the I.D.E.A. Our training and information, is made possible through grants from the U.S. Department of Education, the TN Department of Education, donations, foundations, other grants and the generous contributions of volunteers. STEP provides in-service training and professional development to school systems, community agencies, and disability organizations. Depending on the funding source, there may be a fee for professional development services. Training events hosted by schools where families are invited are always FREE. STEP also provides referral services to disability organizations, support groups, and community agencies.

WHAT SERVICES ARE PROVIDED?

STEP services are designed to help parents, family members, and youth become knowledgeable and effective participants in planning special education programs and how to use the information effectively. Training is provided through:

- Workshops on topics related to special education, equal access to education, and effective communication
- Videos, webinars and a website full of resources
 - How to communicate effectively at meetings.
 - How to prepare for life after high school.
 - How to develop an education plan that addresses social skills, behavior, academics and classroom settings.
 - How to become more involved in your child's education and ensure your child has equal access to educational services.
 - How to prepare for entry into the school system and transitions from grade to grade.
 - How to request evaluations and services.
 - How to discuss the need for related services such as speech therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy or transportation.

STEP offers support services designed to help families and youth build skills to become effective participants in meetings where decisions are being made related to special education and access to an appropriate education. Our services are "customized" to align with the needs of the parent or youth we are serving.
